Throughout his long and financially unsuccessful career, Blakelock had done things Born and raised in New York and mainly self-taught as a painter, Blakelock traveled in the West during the late 1860s and early '70s, taking inspiration from the vast landscapes and American Indian cul-

ture. When he returned East, he turned inward, painting purely visionary landscapes. His specialty was moonlit nocturnes, and the light than emanates from these canvases is only partly of this world. Many of Blakelock's moonlight paintings will be on view at Questroyal, including the great *Eternal Orb*.
